John Tyson is looking to add folks to the **Coats for Kids** team to further the work in this very worthy Rotary project. Can you help?

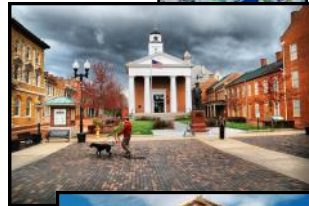


OUR LAST PROGRAM

Leesa Mayfield spoke to our club on architecture, its origins and local applications. Leesa is a graduate of The University of Virginia and became a licensed architect in 2008 and in 2016 she opened her own office here in Winchester.



Architecture design is dictated in large part by materials and technology available. Here in Virginia we use a lot of brick because the material is literally beneath our feet. As transportation became more sophisticated and available so did the availability of different materials such as large glass panes, aluminum, steel and etc..



What many of us consider to be classic beauty is in fact classic design science such as the arch, flying buttress, columns and etc. These designs in large part were and are accommodative of the materials available. Columns of course give support opening up large areas for people to use but its appearance is based upon the human form having a definite head, body and feet. Domes or rotunda's like the University of Virginia's famous Rotunda were born out of necessity but are beautiful at the same time. Even now as science allows us to build in ways that negate the need for arches, columns and domes we still use them for esthetics.



Our own Shenandoah University now utilizes columns and domes in order to tie its architecture together and define the University in a classic and beautiful way. You can see these sorts of tie in details at the Handley Library main branch and even in much more modern structures such as our hospital. Hospitals want to convey a clean and modern scientific look while at the same time be welcoming and empathetic. Virginia Tech has done a wonderful job in tying its buildings together by consistently employing what is known as Hokie Blue Stone.



So look around you and take note of the many beautiful examples of architecture both here and beyond Winchester. It is both worthy of note and pleasing to the eye.

**NOTE FROM D.G. GEORGE KARNES:
 HURRICANE FLORENCE HELP OPPORTUNITY**

Many Rotarians have asked what our District can do to help hurricane relief efforts from Hurricane Florence. I wanted to offer an opportunity to those who are interested to help on the ground in New Bern, NC. Members of my church have an organized team of about 200 people going down on Friday, October 19th, working Saturday and Sunday until about noon on the 21st. The work will vary, but include tree/debris removal, taking furniture, carpet and wet drywall out of homes and general cleaning outside and inside of houses. We have a command center already setup and will work in teams of 7-8.

If you need transportation, we can help with that. For those who are interested, let me know and I can direct you to a website to register and you can get a list of tools you might need. Three things to be aware of.

1. You will most likely be camping. We have a camping area setup at one of our church buildings with working toilets and showers. Some hotel rooms can still be booked but are in short supply.
2. You will need to bring or plan to buy your own food. Most stores are open with supplies.
3. You may bring children, but they must be at least 14 years of age.

This will be a great service opportunity. I have personally done this type of work after several hurricanes when I lived in Florida and after Katrina in Mississippi. I look forward to working with you as we help the people of New Bern, NC.
