TREX BENCH FOR THE JOHN HAND-LEY HIGH SCHOOL PEACE GARDEN

OUR PROGRAM LAST WEEK

Krista Wilson, Program Coordinator for the Winchester-Frederick County Behavioral Health Docket at Northwestern Community Services Board,

spoke about her agency's efforts to reduce recidivism among those with mental health issues in our community.

A mental health docket substitutes a problem-



solving model for traditional court processing. This helps reduce the number of inmates with mental illness. Between 2018 and 2022, the percentage of mentally ill inmates increased from 17% to 25% in men and from 34% to 44% in women. Those inmates require a lot of resources, both financial and staffing.

The key players are NWCSB, Old Dominion Court Services, the Commonwealth Attorney's office, and the public defender's office. The local police and sheriff's offices also participate, as well as Winchester Rescue Mission and Valley Health.

The goals of the program are to use prevention to reduce recidivism among clients, increase treatment engagement by participants, and improve quality of life for those individuals. Outcomes have been increased public safety, reduced costs, and more effective use of local resources. Eligibility includes having only misdemeanors, no violent crime, a medium to high criminogenic risk, a diagnosis of a serious mental illness, and not drug addiction as the sole diagnosis. (Although the program is modeled after drug court, it is not a replacement and is intended for mental health patients.) Candidates for the program are oriented to the process and must agree to participate in the program.

The phases of the program are orientation, stabilization, maintenance and community reintegration, and transition/graduation.

HEALTH TIP

Halloween means carving pumpkins. The tradition of creating jack-o-lanterns began hundreds of years ago in Ireland when people carved faces into turnips (pumpkins were only found in the Americas) to ward off Stingy Jack.



Through a botched "deal with the Devil," Jack was forced to carry a burning light and roam the Earth. Carved turnips were believed to keep him away.

When carving pumpkins, be sure to buy one whose innards you can cook and eat. Health benefits include vitamins, minerals, and fiber. One cup of pumpkin has only 130 calories but 200% of your daily Vitamin C requirements. It also has Vitamin D and potassium, can lower the risk of strokes and kidney stones, and improve bone health. The seeds are edible if you cook them, or you can use them to make crafts.

MEMBERSHIP SURVEY

Heather Hovermale gave a membership update and said that 94 club members participated in our recent survey. Most said they joined Rotary to serve the community, with some adding they also did so for networking and fellowship. More than 80% of respondents were satisfied with their club membership and more than 90% would join again. Some commented there were too many big fundraisers close together, so the Membership Committee is taking steps such as: 1) spacing out the all-hands-on-deck events, like the Rummage Sale, Field of Healing Honor, and Apple Harvest Festival; 2) making Rotary more accessible to parents of younger kids by hosting more family-friendly events with childcare provided; 3) adding more hands-on service opportunities.
