OUR PROGRAM LAST WEEK

Sandi Webster of Family Promise spoke to us about childhood homelessness in Winchester/Frederick Co. and their work in relieving this urgent crisis. They currently assist 58 families and 108 children in Winchester



alone. These families live on the edge and any financial surprise like a car breaking down can cause a spiral of negative events including eviction. Short term housing such as the motels can cost \$2,800 dollars a month and is sans kitchen. Their approach is to assist but have expectations. Clients are required to produce paystubs and evidence of any financial assistance being received. With this information they must attend personal finance classes. There are food deliveries by CCAP, Shenandoah University and several local churches. The Laurel Center is the only shelter for families in Winchester.

Currently Sandy as Director takes no wage. Their goal is to be able to pay their staff, have access to transportation & connect with landlords willing to take section 8 clients. Family Promise can also help with a rental deposit. Safe and qualified childcare can cost as much as college and is difficult to find. Affordable housing has become rare because developers are buying lower end properties and change to a more expensive profile.

Family Promise was established in August of 2022 so it has need for leadership and volunteers. Volunteering could be making cookies, driving or tutoring financial skills. If you'd like to help please Google Family Promise Winchester, Va.

MEMBERSHIP SURVEY

Heather Hovermale gave a membership update and said that 94 club members participated in our recent survey.
